New Hips Give New Life

Collaboration Makes Dream Come True

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In his mid-30s, Marin Community Clinics' patient Jorge Magaña was suffering from unbearable pain. "I would put my hands on my hips to support them, and shuffle at an angle to walk," explains Jorge, who was working at a gas station. "I was in a lot of pain."

In 2005, doctors told him that the cartilage in his hip joints was wearing away due to arthritis. Hip replacement surgery was his only hope. But there was one problem—Jorge was uninsured and having surgery performed on both hips would cost thousands of dollars.

Five years later, Marin Community Clinics, Novato Community Hospital, and a surgeon came together to help Jorge. Today, he is living a better, pain-free life.

"I'm a new man!" beams the now 40-year-old. The goal of providing for his family, including twin boys and a daughter, keeps him motivated. "I have dreams like any other father. I want to take my kids to Disneyland."

Here's how the story unfolded.

By 2010, the pain and stiffness were so extreme that Jorge could not work. He came to Marin Community Clinics for help.

"Jorge was trying his best to deal with the worst hips I've ever seen," recalls Leslie Cunningham, a volunteer physical therapist at the clinic. "Nothing helped. It was just bone on bone."

Jorge then met retired orthopedic surgeon Dr. Kevin Harrington, another of our volunteer specialists, who became his strongest advocate. Harrington had a list of patients who needed in-hospital surgery, and he moved Jorge's name to the top.

But the team hit some obstacles. "We tried to get the local orthopedic physicians to see Jorge and perform the surgery at no cost, but weren't having any luck," explains Linda Tavaszi, CEO. "It is just not fair to ask patients to put their lives on hold."

And then, even worse, Dr. Harrington, Jorge's greatest champion, passed away unexpectedly. Tavaszi and her staff decided to turn their grief into action – they refused to give up. Tavaszi approached administrators at Sutter Health's

Marin Community Clinics' mission – to improve the health of our patients and community by providing high quality, cost–effective, culturally sensitive, patient–centered health care – is not just a phrase found on our website and brochures or on a sign on our walls. You can find it in those places, but more than that, it is demonstrated every day in the actions of our clinicians, staff, and volunteers.

Our mission statement was carefully crafted and each word precisely chosen, as with most mission-driven organizations. We know that improving the health of

individuals contributes to the health of the community at large. We also know that high quality, culturally sensitive, patient–centered health care must be cost–effective in order to be sustained over time. Conversely, cost effectiveness alone cannot sustain our health center – the patient experience must be positive in every arena, from scheduling the appointment, to walking into a clean and pleasant environment, to being received at the reception desk and then taken to the back office, to seeing their medical, dental or behavioral health provider, to receiving appropriate discharge information, to talking to the billing department if a need arises.

Maintaining high quality standards – such as having a high percentage of patients receive appropriate cancer screenings – is not achieved in a vacuum. Patient care must be delivered with sensitivity, and access to services must be adequate for desired quality outcomes to be achieved.

The interactions of clinicians, staff, and volunteers with our patients and with one another illustrate our organizational values – integrity, respect, diversity, competency, and teamwork – to create an excellent experience for our patients. Having a collective commitment to ethical behavior, conveying mutual respect, promoting and respecting diversity, committing to the highest level of accountability in demonstrating our abilities in providing quality care, and promoting teamwork and collaboration are all vital elements in carrying out our mission.

The Affordable Care Act means that more of our patients now have health insurance, and that is a welcome change. However, there remain a significant number of patients who are not eligible for insurance.

Our mission remains the same, whether a patient has insurance or not. And your continued support is crucial for Marin Community Clinics to continue to deliver outstanding health care to all who turn to us for high quality, culturally sensitive, cost-effective, patient-centered health care.

Novato Community Hospital (NCH), who agreed right away to the surgery. But they still needed a surgeon for what would be a complex surgery.

Brian Alexander, NCH's administrator, finally found a willing partner in Dr. Robert Mayle, who was brand new to the community. He immediately agreed to perform the surgery. "Hip replacements can dramatically change someone's life," said Dr. Mayle. "Jorge couldn't stand up straight. He was in so much pain that he couldn't even play with his kids."

Jorge's dream came true when he underwent bilateral hip replacement surgery in October 2013, and following a short rehabilitation, he's now walking his way into a better, painfree life.

"I'm a new man!" beams the now 40-year-old. And the goal of providing for his family, including twin boys and a daughter, keeps him motivated. "I have dreams like any other father. I want to take my kids to Disneyland."

"It is a wonderful thing when health care providers come together like this," said Tavaszi. "My hope is that, with the Affordable Care Act, people like Jorge will no longer have to wait to get the care they need." Jorge is now back at work and enjoying life again, and he now has health insurance under the Affordable Care Act.

Health Care Reform becomes a reality in Marin

Health Care Reform and the Affordable Care Act are now a reality. This is a historic time in our nation's health care and Marin Community Clinics is contributing to its success.

March 31st was the deadline for individuals to enroll in Covered California, the health insurance exchange that offers a variety of affordable insurance options to under-insured and uninsured residents. In Marin, over 13,000 residents qualified for Covered CA or the expanded Medi-Cal program.

The enrollment process has not been an easy one. It has required extensive community outreach and hands-on counseling to educate people about the existence of the Affordable Care Act and what it means to them, to assess their eligibility, and to explain their options.

When enrollment began in October 2013, we knew that Marin Community Clinics, as Marin's largest safety net provider, would play a major role. We also knew that special effort would be needed to ensure that our existing patients and the community at large were informed and that they enrolled on time. (For qualified individuals who missed the Covered CA deadline, enrollment will be open again in October 2014. There is no deadline for Medi-Cal enrollment.)

Health care reform is here! Call, qualify and enroll for free or affordable health coverage.

First, with the help of a government grant, we increased our enrollment staff. Then, in addition to sending two letters to our patients, we opened an insurance hotline, made presentations at local churches in English, Spanish and Portuguese, participated in the College of Marin Health Fair, spoke to local non-profit organizations with a large base of uninsured clients, and participated in other events throughout the county. We collaborated with Marin's other community health centers and the Marin County Department of Health and Human Services to maximize outreach and enrollment efforts.

Our hard work has paid off. As of the end of March, Marin Community Clinics has assisted over 6,000 people with information about Covered CA or Medi-Cal.

Vanessa Monsebaiz is one of Marin Community Clinics' certified enrollment counselors. She's had a full plate – returning telephone calls and emails from our hotline and personally meeting with people at the San Rafael clinic to assist them with the process. Like others on the team, including Hugo Moreano, Armando Cerros, Irma Gonzalez, Patricia Tobin, and Vitor Coral, she has seen a variety of clients – people who are unemployed, self-employed, or employed by businesses that provide limited or no health insurance.

"People who have never had health insurance are incredibly relieved after we meet with them," reported Vanessa. "You can see it on their faces. I make sure they are eligible and explain their options. It's a lot to absorb. Often we do the online enrollment together right on the spot. It's a gratifying experience to help those who have been struggling with not having adequate insurance."

We've learned some lessons since this journey started.

- Many of those who inquire about coverage were in fact eligible for Medi-Cal before Reform took place, but were unaware of its existence.
- Despite the experience reported state-wide, the Latino community in Marin has shown significant interest in learning about insurance options.
- Women have played a key role in spreading the word.
- Those who had been denied coverage because of pre-existing conditions anxiously awaited Health Care Reform so that they could finally have insurance and are now extremely relieved to be insured.

The Affordable Care Act is not perfect, but it is certainly better than the system we had before. It will go a long way towards increasing access to health care and will help Marin Community Clinics carry out its mission — to improve the health of our patients and the community by providing high quality, cost–effective, culturally sensitive, patient–centered health care.

Passionate about improving the lives of others, she is known as "the Book Lady" at Marin Community Clinics, she keeps the bookshelves filled with donated books to ensure that pediatric patients can take a book home after visiting their doctor.

"Before Judie became involved in the book program, we barely had enough books for our young patients", says Novato Clinic Director, Susan Wiebers. "Thanks to her commitment we are now able to offer a book to every child visiting our clinic, patient or sibling."



Dr. Albert Varner has been a volunteer gastroenterologist at Marin Community Clinics for over 25 years. He started volunteering when we were providing health care in church basements in Mill Valley and Fairfax, before we opened our Greenbrae clinic. In addition to

providing GI consultative services, Dr. Varner also served on Marin Community Clinics' *Building a Healthy Future* Capital Campaign Committee, tirelessly seeking donations for the historic – and successful – initiative to build our San Rafael and Novato clinics.

During his career, he served as Chief of Medicine and member of the Medical Executive Committee at Marin General Hospital.
